PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

STUDENT TIPS FOR 2018 SUCCESS

- Get organised now. Do not leave starting or it will be too late.
- Complete 3-4 hours study a night.
- Take one day off during the weekend. Study the other.
- Work together as a team. Library opens at 8.00AM.
- Acknowledge that you are competing against the rest of the State and if you are not studying someone else will be (for every hour you are not studying, someone somewhere is).
- The best way to learn is to explain the concept to someone else.
- Be highly competitive. Want the best SAC/Trial Exam mark.
- Continually asked questions and make contact with your teachers outside of class.
- Complete as many practice SAC's and exams as possible.
- Prioritise school over part-time work. Work reduces your study time.
- School term holidays are a time to study and revise not party.
- When you do study, make the most of the time. Reading is not studying. Some students sit for 3 hours and learn nothing.
- Every student has to find their own best way to study. The same technique does not work for everyone.
- Study in silence. No TV. No Phone. No Music.
- Techniques used for study could include summarising notes, develop cue-cards, create mind maps and posters.
- Use Edrolo it is amazing!
- Take notes in class when the teacher is talking. Revise those notes that night.
- Have a study plan. Identify times when you eat, sleep, relax, play sport, work and study.
- Every Sunday night plan for the week ahead.
- Set goals for the future '9 months of pain for a lifetime of gain.'
- No better feeling than knowing you did your very best.
- Keep wanting to get it right. Ask and practice until you do. Don't quit.







FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee famillies. The allowance is poid to the school to use towards expensee relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

• \$125 for primary school students
