LEARNING AND TEACHING

Catholic College are committed to respectful relationships and we actively seek a partnership with parents. TERM 3 HOLIDAY VCE PRACTICE EXAMS - SAVE THE DATE -

Practice examinations for Year 12 students and Year 11 students completing a Unit 3/4 sequence will take place during the Term 3 school holidays. These exams provide valuable learning and preparatory experience for students, are taken under examination conditions and give the students valuable practice at exam technique. In addition, these practice exams will enable students to focus on any areas that need improvement for the extremely short amount of time available in Term 4.

We are unable to make these examinations compulsory for students given that they are during school holidays, however they will prove to be a worthwhile experience and students should make every effort to be present and assist the College in its endeavour to provide the best possible preparation prior to the examinations in October/November.

SINGAPORE FOOD TOUR

Nine students and three staff set off on the inaugural oriental food tour of Singapore on a cold winter's morning for Tullamarine. After a smooth passage through baggage drops, security and customs, the group was en-route to their destination; hot and steamy Singapore.

On landing, we were met by Jasmin, whom would be our tour guide for the week. The hotel, our home for 6 nights was located near Bugis Junction, lots of food and retail markets and the buzz of city life. Once settled into the Hotel we embarked on a quick discovery expedition of Bugis street market for supper and experienced some Asian inspired spicy street food with salmon, squid & Korean Popcorn chicken.



Day two was our first full day started with a visit to an incredible temple – Lian Shan Shuang Lin, followed by a tour of the city and our first real food experience at one of the many Hawkers markets we would visit during our stay. We had the opportunity to try some Duck feet but mostly went for the crispy pork options. A Bum Boat ride was then enjoyed, this took in Clark and Boat Quays and the old district of Singapore where the cargo boats used to arrive. For dinner we feasted at Din Tai Fung on a host of different dumplings and plates of various green vegetables. Everyone loved the dumpling house!

On day three we were up and into a cooking class with a Prata Chef. We were to create Roti Prata (a type of



Indian flat bread) but the majority of us failed on this mission to be Prata Chefs. We also learnt to pour the traditional tea, a very sweet and milky brew. Next we headed off to the Singapore Museum for a cultural tour and a walk up the popular Orchard Road. We visited a Japanese 'Food Lovers Fiesta' where lots of food samples were on offer to try. Dinner was at another Hawkers market, Newton Circus, where a large choice of dishes from the various local cultures available in Singapore including Indian, Malaysian, Indonesian was amazing. Chilli crab, a traditional Singapore dish was on the menu for Nathan, who was not disappointed.

Chinatown was our first port of call for day four where we participated in a heritage cooking class. Here we were taught to pound the various spices to make a local recipe chicken curry. A traditional dessert was also made which

was very sweet. A walk was needed after lunch so we headed to the Spice Gardens, which contains the plants, herbs and trees that we could touch, feel and smell the seeds, leaves and stems that were the catalyst for all discovery and conquest to South East Asia medicinal and culinary uses. Dinner tonight was in Chinatown, where we experienced a wide variety of Chinese dishes, all freshly cooked. On dark, we positioned ourselves on the steps at Marina Bay Sands for a spectacular music and light show over the water.

Day five we set off to the old Chinese district of Joo Chiat with the Peranakan quaint shop/ houses. In the heritage centre we saw how Chinese traditions, cooking utensils, women's clothing etc has developed throughout the generations. Here, we also tried a variety of Chinese desserts and various teas (which were

various colours) which are very different to what we have. A quick visit to an Indian Muslim bakery where (supposedly) was the home of the creation of the curry puff (samosa). We were able to sample the different types of samosa's.

Our cooking class experience today was in a tiny shop front where traditional 'popiah skins' are made for spring rolls. These skins were made on huge round hotplates, four at a time. We then filled our skins with lovely fresh ingredients, homemade sauces, then rolled and devoured by all. Vivo City was our lunch destination, where a more European menu was on offer. Dinner was in Little India, Lagnaa Barefoot Dining. Here we sat on cushions, sharing



various Indian dishes that were made from local fresh ingredients. Each dish and its contents, cooking techniques were explained to the group prior to serving. To quote the head chef. "At Lagnaa we invite you to bare your feet and feed your soul."

Our last day in Singapore, included a trip to the Gardens by the Bay Cloud Forest., where we had a leisurely wander through the Cloud Dome surrounded by diverse vegetation and magnificent displays of plants and



flowers. Lunch was a traditional Seafood laksa at a quaint local restaurant. There was enough time prior to catching our flight home for a quick last-minute shop at Bugis Junction. Then off to Changi airport to start our journey home after a very busy immersion of a cultural culinary adventure of cooking and eating in Singapore.









PATHWAYS

The year is fast slipping away and the Year 12 students have only weeks to go before they are finished.

At the end of last term I shared some information with the Year 12s concerning the future of university funding, which will impact on the offers made by universities in January 2019.

Briefly, at the end of 2017 the universities and other tertiary providers were told that the Federal Government would be capping the funding at 2017 levels. In the preceding years the universities had been funded per head for each student they attracted. This had allowed for about a 1.5% growth in student numbers each year.

How will this change things for our students? The likely impact will be that there will be more students competing for a smaller number of places. It won't be dramatic but it will be there.

This may mean a rise in the Adjusted Selection Ranking being higher. This Adjusted Selection Ranking begins by being based on the ATAR and then has various bonuses added through Special Entry Access Scheme applications and bonuses for preferred subjects.

There are a number of special pathways schemes that the universities have that can be used to help. Students need to check this for themselves, and were told about this at the end of Term Two.

Focussing on their studies is really important. In this way they should be able to increase their base ATAR.

I think most of our students will be accommodated somewhere.

What Our Students Did Last Year.

Last year (2018 Year 12s) we had 96 students who put in preferences with the Victoria Tertiary Admissions Centre. Of that number, 88 received an offer. Nine students did not enrol and 28 chose to defer their studies.

In the nine there was at least one, if not two who applied interstate, with at least one taking up an apprenticeship.

Based on these figures our students are very acceptable to the universities in Victoria. We can expect a similar outcome this year. The real message is, get an account open on VTAC after the 6th of August and work as hard as you can. The chances are in your favour.


VTAC preferences are live on the 6th of August. All Year 12 students are encouraged to activate their account and begin the process early. Students can have up to eight courses listed.

At the end of July students were spoken to by a representative of Centrelink. Students were given information to help them in transitioning from school to the next level, study or work, and encouraged to make contact with Centrelink early to create a MyGov account before they are at the pointy end. There is a calculator on the MyGov website which might help in establishing if they are eligible for any payments. Students have also received a VTAC booklet to assist with applications for putting in preferences.

There are two different guides, one each for Year 11 and Year 12. This is a new approach to combine the two years of VCE into one publication. There is a booklet for Year 10s as well.

Years 10s have also received a government publication called 'Where to now?'. If it didn't reach home but you want a copy, ask your child or alternatively, send me a message.

shopping centre from August 6th for the community to view so that we can all build awareness of this issue and come one step closer towards ending homelessness.



Bishop Visit

Recently the Year 12s were able to hear from a Bishop from central Nigeria, Bishop Michael. The Bishop was visiting priests from his diocese who are currently based in Sale and Canberra. He spoke to the students about Nigeria, which has the seventh largest population in the world, and the benefits and tensions of living in a country which was colonised and then left by the British. The interactions between traditional African religions, Christians and Islamic people were a major focus of his talk. Due to tribal areas being changed during the British occupation, a lot of tension now exists between groups claiming land for their own peoples. This leads to many moments of extreme violence around Nigeria. The Year 12s learnt of the sacrifices and determination of the people of Nigeria as they seek peace and justice.

At the end of the talk, one of our Year 12s, Shayne, asked the Bishop what was his favourite memory of Nigeria. His answer was a bit of a shock when he spoke of the time his father died. However, what followed was a beautiful story of his father passing on his inheritance and responsibilities through a beautiful ritual of trust and acknowledgement. We came to appreciate the depth of spirituality and humanity which can be found in simple rituals.



We thank the Bishop for his generosity in visiting us and also in allowing his priests to come to Australia as missionaries to help build the Church and the faith of its people.

IN THE CLASSROOM

Presentation on Alice's Adventures in Wonderland

On Monday 6th August, the Year 10 Literature class were privy to a guest speaker in Jeff Hobbs. Jeff was able to create a positive look at Lewis Carroll, where, through readings and stories, his enthusiasm for this subject became evident. The students were given many different ideas, elements and facts that they noted down for further discussions and assessment pieces.

Through several readings such as The Hunting of the Snark and The Jabberwocky, which were great to listen to, the students could see how different readings of a text could change by altering emphasis. The idea of different interpretations was clearly outlined through a range of books and a couple of articles that he had for the students to peruse. For example the text, Alitji in the Dreamtime, was a rewriting of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, using Pitjantjatjara language. The animals were representative of the times and the culture.

This informal event was not only interesting but also opened student eyes to ways a text can be 'read'. It reminded them of things already learned in class and extended their understanding of where they could take this text in the future. Plus the 'coveted hat' was great to try on! MATHS CAMP


During the July School holidays three of the school's Year 10 maths students (Bradley Felton, Erin and Bridget Forster) attended the Mathematical Association of Victoria's (MAV) Year 10 Mathematics Camp. Here is Erin and Bridget's reflection of the camp:

MAV Maths Camp is a week-long chance to see how Maths is used in business - Maths in the 'real world'. Our main focus was our group project, provided by different industries: including Victorian Space Science Education Centre (VSSEC); The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA); Ford; and Biarri Windsor. Throughout the week 24 of us visited these different businesses gaining an understanding of who they were and how they use maths, as well as each group spending time with their mentor.

We spent our evenings at RMIT or the State Library working through these projects. Many people from different careers met with us over dinner and shared their backgrounds in maths, regularly leaving the whole room in tears of laughter.

The MAV Maths Camp group of 2018, summarised their work as: Quadratics, rapid questions, astronaut training, blood analysis, designing features and Virtual Reality inspections of cars as well as keeping Australia's economy stable.

Not all the time was spent doing maths. We built bonds as a family within the first half an hour which was only made stronger through extra free time, mostly spent in the lounge on level 3, and activities such as Bounce and the Queen Vic Night Market; actually we spent every hour together from 6am-10pm!



The hardest part was doing what seemed to be "impossible maths", late at night; however we all had an undeniable motivation and love for it, making it seem less like a chore and more like any other day with friends. Everyone took on their challenge with determination, which made working through each challenge a team effort, often paying off in the end.

This experience gave us a better understanding on how maths is used in the real world, and it taught us how the city works. We recognised that there are people out there who are just the same as us. The whole week was full of amazing memories and these are friends made for life through an experience we will be forever grateful for and would repeat in a heartbeat.




MARIST NETBALL
