TERM 3 HOLIDAY VCE PRACTICE EXAMS - SAVE THE DATE -

Practice examinations for Year 12 students and Year 11 students completing a Unit 3/4 sequence will take place during the Term 3 school holidays between **September 30th and October 3rd.** These exams provide valuable learning and preparatory experience for students, are taken under examination conditions and give the students valuable practice at exam technique. In addition, these practice exams will enable students to focus on any areas that need improvement for the extremely short amount of time available in Term 4.

We are unable to make these examinations compulsory for students given that they are during school holidays, however they will prove to be a worthwhile experience and students should make every effort to be present and assist the College in its endeavour to provide the best possible preparation prior to the examinations in October/November.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

There is significant research that shows students who are most successful at school have a balanced attitude to organising their life commitments. They devote an appropriate time to study and homework, but they also play sports, have part time jobs and have time for friends and family. Being able to participate in various forms of activity helps young people grow, develop positive relationships with peers and adults, keep them physically and therefore mentally fit, and gives them opportunities to develop life skills.

At times students can feel overwhelmed by work when it starts to mount up, and some often have no systematic approach to dealing with it. I would encourage the use of a weekly planning tool to assist students to get on top of their work. All of the students at Catholic College Sale are given a College diary at the start of the year. Inside the front cover of the diary is a Study Planner. I would strongly suggest that students put in all commitments and then add College expectations. I have added our suggested homework/study times.

Year 8 - Time Management

- Use colour and organise your notes.


Year 11 - Memory Improvement Tools

- Test yourself with out your notes.


Year 12 - Final Exams

- Get feedback from your teachers





Camps Sports and Excursion Fund 2019

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) provides payments for eligible students.

Who can apply

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. There are two criteria that must be met (please read the information on the links below):

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2018, you do not need to complete an application form in 2019 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

Your child's school will apply for the CSEF on your behalf.

You will only need to submit an application form in 2019 if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments: your child has started or changed schools in 2019 or you did not apply at the same school in 2018
- changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019
