If we move to Remote Learning, it is important that students are engaged in the normal school timetable. Students who are not accessing their lessons will be contacted by the school to assist with difficulties, where possible. Please ensure you are accessing PAM and taking note of instructions as they arrive. It is very important that our young people do not miss out on their learning opportunities as school will resume as normal, as soon as possible.

At the moment, teaching staff will return to work on Tuesday 14th April with students returning on Wednesday 15th April.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

We are living in tumultuous times and the College is working hard to support its community to maximise student learning in difficult circumstances. Should the situation require us to close the College for an extended period of time, we expect to continue our programs remotely. Our staff have received guidance to allow them to confidently deliver remote learning opportunities using a combination of our existing Learning Management System SIMON and Google Docs.

We will deliver curriculum using flipped classrooms, where students progress through work that is set, with support from

that NAPLAN will not proceed in 2020. The decision was made to assist school leaders, teachers and support staff to focus on the wellbeing of students and continuity of education.

teachers. Lessons documented on SIMON via Class Notices will require parent involvement, and progress can be monitored via the Parent Access Module. The College has developed a number of Remote Learning Guidelines that are available here.

Our normal teaching and learning program, like that of most schools, is not designed for remote learning, and we will put in place the contingencies outlined above only as a last resort in order to maintain continuity in your child/children's learning and to ensure the health and safety of the whole community.

I understand parents and guardians of Year 12 students may be anxious. We will do our utmost to



minimise disruption to their learning. The Victorian Certificate of Education scheduled School Assessed Coursework (SACs) require supervision in order to be completed. Consequently, we will obtain advice from the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) to ensure that any closure does not unduly impact VCE assessments. Should the situation require closure of the school for an extended period of time, it is likely we would be one of many schools thus affected.

In these circumstances, students can feel overwhelmed by work and some often have no systematic approach to dealing with it. With the possibility of the transition to Remote Learning, I would strongly encourage the use of a weekly planning tool to assist students to remain on top of their work. All of the students at Catholic College Sale are given a College Diary at the start of the year and I would encourage them to utilise these. Inside the front cover of the diary is a Study Planner.

I want to remind all VCE students that if we move to Remote Learning the same requirements exists for homework over and above the daily learning schedule.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

Term 3 Holiday VCE Practice Exams - Save the Date -

Practice examinations for Year 11 and 12 students completing a Unit 3/4 sequence will take place during the Term 3 school holidays between **September 28th and October 1st.** These exams provide valuable learning and preparatory experience for students, are taken under examination conditions and give the



students valuable practice at exam technique. In addition, these practice exams will enable students to focus on any areas that need improvement for the extremely short amount of time available in Term 4. We are unable to make these examinations compulsory for students given that they are during school holidays, however they will prove to be a worthwhile experience and students should make every effort to be present and assist the College in its endeavour to provide the best possible preparation prior to the examinations in October/November.

LEARNING AND WELLBEING

At Catholic College Sale, we continue to encourage all learners to participate with their learning pathways, particularly to remain positive about attending school (face to face or via remote learning), engaging in all subject areas and collaborating with the peers to enjoy and engage in their own education.

For our students, the routine of attending school gives them clear expectations, boundaries, and consistency, thus building routines to help them feel supported and safe. Developing students with good work habits whilst upholding their schooling commitments, forms a level of resilience whilst supporting the development of strong work ethics for adolescents.

As outlined by the Melbourne Child Psychology & School Psychology Services, researchers indicate that the familiarity that comes with routine (particularly regular attendance at school) offers the perfect 'safe space' that kids need. "A consistent routine in the home will have far fewer variables, so your kids can relax in knowing what to expect".

To provide families with simple guidelines to engage with your child who may be feeling anxious about the current situation, this attachment (click here) provides a simple process to support young people through the International Coronavirus (Covid – 19) outbreak.

If in the event of school closure and remote schooling occurring at Catholic College Sale, students may continue to access Student Wellbeing support staff including House Leader/Year Level Leaders, via school email and/ or via the Online Counselling Appointments process using SIMON. The Wellbeing Team will endeavour to continue to support our students where possible to give additional support towards their learning and personal development.

I would also like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the positive contribution made by many students to uphold a positive contribution to the College Community. This includes participation in the SEED Wellbeing program, along with the Sion Student Leaders participating in a Leadership Formation Day, held at St Patrick's campus. Olympic Trials Qualification

The 19 year old recorded a personal best time of 2.14.87 minutes in the women's open 800 metres at the recent State Track and Field Championships, just 48 hours before the deadline for qualification.

GEOGRAPHY EXCURSION

Unit 3 Geography students Field trip to Phillip Island Nature Park.

The Unit 3 Geography class travelled to Phillip Island in order to investigate the impact of 'land use change' in regards to the habitat of the little penguin colony at Summerlands Beach. We left on the Monday at recess and returned the following day.

As a group we learnt that that the colony is currently thriving due the concerted efforts of the management team to revegetate and control the feral animal population on the island. The colony was in severe decline until a 1980's program of acquisition of all houses on the Summerland Estate (which is penguin breeding habitat) began. It took over a decade and many millions of dollars to buy back all the houses and revegetate the area.

Now, the penguin colony is expanding and numbers have grown from 800 back in the 1970's to over 32,000 today. Our guide Sue was a ranger with many years' experience and she was very passionate about the Island and its environment. She gave us great insights into the issues surrounding the land use change that has occurred here. She showed us direct evidence as to how habitat restoration can impact on the health of these little creatures and the overall colony.

The night before we had joined 1000 plus tourists to watch the penguin parade. Here the 1100 penguins waddled up the beach to find their



burrows. This in itself was quite amazing as visitors are able gain an excellent view of the parents returning to feed their chicks as they peer down from the boardwalk at the burrows.

Geography students are now compiling a Field Trip Report based on the data they gathered. Students had a very interesting day and should be able to produce a report that reflects their firsthand knowledge of this site.





PROJECT COMPASSION

The launch of Project Compassion in 2020 was held at St Francis Xavier College Beaconsfield, focussing on working together in our global community to support the worlds most vulnerable with our actions and generosity. Ten students from our Year 10 Religious Education Service in Action (RESA) class attended the launch. Students then enjoyed Shrove Tuesday celebrations with pancakes in a gathering afterwards with all other participating schools.

MUSIC -

2020 has so far brought much in the way of growth in the Music Department. The demand for music lessons is continuing to grow – we have 75 students currently taking lessons - which is fantastic news not only for the Music Department but for the College as a whole. Currently our Rock Band program has two Year 7 and two Year 8 Rock Bands. There is a Concert Band, a String group, Sion Singers – open to all interested Year 7 and 8 students, Show Choir – a select Senior close harmony group, MVC – a male vocal group open to all interested Year 9-12 males, and a Guitar Ensemble at the Sion campus.
