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Dear College Community,

The last few months have been a challenge for us all. As a society we made significant decisions about the necessity to stay safe and support each other as the COVID-19 pandemic unfolded in Australia. As a community we are to be congratulated on how we have taken on the wellbeing and support of all we share this beautiful country with. Many people have had to pay a price and some more than others. The College, as always, is here to support families who have experienced significant difficulty and continue to experience challenges as we begin to take some control of our current situation.

I would particularly like to thank our students who moved very quickly to a strange and unusual Remote Learning environment. They were of course, ably supported by our teaching staff but also by the College support staff who worked to keep the College doors open for students of essential workers and students who were unable to embrace Remote Learning at home.

Reflection from Pope Francis who has urged us to use this time of the Coronavirus pandemic to:

"rediscover the importance of small acts of kindness, affection and compassion that often go unnoticed in daily life, but they are nonetheless decisive, important," he said,

"a hot meal, a caress, a hug, a phone call.

They are familiar gestures of attention to the details of everyday life that make life meaningful and that create communion and communication among us.".

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Remote Learning, in many instances has only been achievable with the support of parents and carers. This has emphasised a real team approach and the learning triangle that is required for students to do their very best - students, parents and the College. Thank you to everyone for your patience, adaptability and care for each other in an experience that was, and is, unique to each individual.

Last week we celebrated the return of our Years 11 and 12 students, together with Year 10 students accessing a VCE/VET subject, and our students in Years 7 – 10 completing their Remote Learning on-site. A school is really not a school without its students.

On the 9th June 2020, we will celebrate the return of all our Years 7 – 10 students. The return of face to face learning is only possible if we maintain the health requirements outlined by our governing authorities. Respecting social distancing, maintaining good hygiene, regular hand washing and remaining at home if unwell. COVID-19 is still with us but we pray that we continue to keep it under control and our society healthy. One of the essential aspects for returning to face to face learning is to maintain a stable environment within what is known as the 'new normal'. Students learn best and fulfil their full potential when consistency and standards are maintained. Last week we reminded our returning students that learning, presentation (uniform) and behaviour standards continue to be our priority. It is our continued aim that all students continue to do their very best in this interrupted year. We especially think of our Year 12 students who have experienced a very different final year of secondary education. We value their leadership within our College and the example they show to our younger students as we support them to achieve their goals into their future.

This Wednesday, 3rd June, we celebrate the Feast of St Marcellin Champagnat (actually 6th June) by asking all our on-site students to participate in a 'socially distanced Footsteps Walk and Celebration'. This walk involves a scaled down version of our usual celebration with a walk around and gathering on the College ovals. Information will be available prior to the event. Unfortunately, this year we will not be able to celebrate this day with the all College Mass.

The College continues its redevelopment program throughout the COVID-19 situation. The John XXIII project is on track to ensure all students, Years 7 - 12, will commence 2021 on the one campus. The College is currently upgrading its central courtyard and has a number of other smaller projects planned for later in the year.

Throughout the remainder of Term 2, we will continue to plan for the second half of 2020. We sincerely hope that societies COVID-19 requirements allow us to proceed with a number of normal student activities and events. Only time will tell.

We pray for all in our community who have lost loved ones, or are currently ill, during this time.

LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

Dear Catholic College Sale Community Members

I write to you at a time when I know that each of you have been dealing with the challenges that we faced, and continue to face, as a community regarding COVID 19. All staff have been working hard to ensure that Remote Learning has been a meaningful medium for our students to continue their Learning during Term 2. I know we are all appreciative of student and staff efforts with the Remote Learning program but we are all very pleased to see the return to the 'new normal' of face to face teaching.

As you are aware, Catholic College Sale is vacating the Sion Campus at the end of this school year. This will result in all our students being located at the Catholic College Sale, St Patrick's Campus in 2021. In leaving the Sion Campus, we know that we are leaving behind a tradition and story that has helped to shape who we are and what we value today. We have ensured that the Sion story will continue at the St Patrick's Campus. Our Charism walk at the entrance to our College captures the important characteristics of the Sion and Marist Charisms. Mary invites us from a way of practicing our faith through the charisms to meet and know her son, Jesus, Our Lord. In our reception area we have visually preserved the story of the Sion Sisters and the Marist Brothers when they first arrived in Gippsland.

The Sisters arrived in Sale to establish their first foundation on 1 March 1890. The Sisters took over the direction of the parish school in Sale and opened a secondary school, which later became a boarding school. We are planning a Decommissioning Ceremony of the Sion Campus and opportunities for the school community to celebrate and give thanks for the Sisters presence in Sale. This will take place later this year or when the 'new normal' allows us to gather and celebrate our history.

As you drive past the College, you will see that we are working on the John 23rd building. It will accommodate our Years 7 and 8 students. We are confident that the building and necessary landscaping of gardens and sporting areas will be ready to welcome the staff and students from the Sion Campus and our incoming Year 7 students. Our upgrading program will continue into the future.

In spite of all the challenges we face in ensuring that the 2020 school year is a positive experience for staff and students, we are also making sure that the necessary planning and works are being undertaken as scheduled to enable a smooth transition to a one-campus college in 2021.

I will continue to communicate with you on progress of this project. Please know that I am available to speak with you about any of our projects or any concerns you have in regarding the College's Ministry of Service to the College Community.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

Catholic College Sale's teachers and support staff have worked tirelessly over the past weeks to ensure student's online experience of education was effective and purposeful. The end of this period of remote learning is now in sight and there is a great sense of anticipation as we prepare to welcome back our whole school community from the 9th of June. Remote learning has presented significant challenges for all and we particularly thank our parents and caregivers who have overwhelmingly supported the College initiatives to keep all students engaged and growing their knowledge and skills.

We have seen some positives come from remote learning, mostly surrounding the versatility and adaptability of our whole community. As we move back to onsite learning I take great faith and reassurance from John Hattie research, from Christchurch New Zealand. After their earthquake and a prolonged absence from school student results went up because teachers tailored learning to what students could not do, whereas often school is about what we think students need, even if students can already do the tasks. This must give us confidence to tackle learning face-to-face again with renewed energy and a sense of hope and purpose.

Whilst remote schooling is effective nothing replaces face-to-face teaching. We know, because research tells us that the most effective and influential factor in maximising student outcomes is the efficacy of the teacher in the classroom. We have a unique opportunity as educators and students supported by our wonderful parents and caregivers to reflect on our experience of remote learning model and face to face learning and ask ourselves what worked better and what new skills can we use looking forward.

This re-set on how learning and teaching is afforded to us in the coming weeks has the opportunity to reflect on where there is necessary change as we continue to commit to developing better outcomes for all our students at Catholic College Sale.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on SchoolStudents with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on SchoolStudents with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students



with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

It has been inspiring to see most students engage with their learning in Religious Education during this time of remote learning. Many students have been able to express their ideas and thoughts about a wide range of topics across the year levels. For many students this way of learning has given them the opportunity to express their thoughts and ideas to their teacher when the usual classroom setting

may have made them feel uncomfortable doing so.

Our Year 12 Seminar students spent a lot of their lesson time looking for ways to find meaning in a new and confronting situation. In one lesson they were challenged to look beyond themselves and reach out to others who might be in need or might be feeling isolated during this time. Some students wrote letters to grandparents or to aunts or uncles. Others chose to write to people in nursing homes or hospitals. One of our students, our service cabinet leader, Tahlia, received a lovely letter back from Sale Hospital thanking her for taking the time to think of them (see picture right).



One of the most touching letters was written in response to the deaths of four members of our Police Force. Kasey addressed her letter to all member of Victoria Police:

To all members of Victoria Police,

In this time of the COVID-19 crisis we ensure to praise all those whose careers are essential in improving the situation of our communities, we acknowledge our nurses, doctors and an extensive list of other healthcare workers who risk it all to keep us safe. I find we often neglect to thank those who work tirelessly to ensure that restrictions are being adhered to, the officers who also leave their families everyday despite the risks, as well as those working from home or from the office to assist members who are experiencing a state of compromised mental/physical health. All members across the state share an equal importance in the community and deserve to be recognised for their continuous sacrifices.

As a daughter of two Victoria Police members I saw first-hand the shock the passing of four, valued members of Victoria Police had on the community. The anguish experienced by the families, friends and colleagues during this already chaotic year is completely unimaginable. This gut-wrenching event would have undoubtedly taken an enormous toll on the entire VICPOL community. I am hoping to remind each and every member that your hard work is being acknowledged every day and that we are forever grateful for your sacrifices. I hope that every day when you get dressed for work you know that there are people who look up to you and perceive you as the heroes you are and your dedication doesn't go unnoticed.

Coronavirus, Creativity and Remote Schooling

COVID19 has both challenged us and has presented us with different opportunities.

Although remote schooling has been difficult for both our families and CCS staff, it has offered me the chance to rethink the way I teach and the way that my students learn from me.

The way in which students have supported each other, by messaging if they can't get online, or being on a friend's phone as a way of being present in the meeting because their Internet is poor and us waving to each other through a screen, then through another screen – amazing resourcefulness and mateship.




Year 9 Wood and Metalwork Technology. Remote learning Task:


To design a sleeping portal to accommodate 2 homeless people.

Students were given a brief to research and design a movable sleeping portal. The students came up with some excellent designs, with informed judgements of preferred materials and sustainability that they had researched. Students then had to produce a scaled down prototype using whatever materials that were available to them such as lego and cardboard. This task allowed students to address a growing social issue, research and design and construct a prototype solution then evaluate it. Students are looking forward to returning to school and building their hands on skills in the Trade Skills Centre.









Year 7 Digital Technology

Some of our year 7 groups took part in an industry-supported digital technology programme called CS in Schools this semester. CS in Schools is a volunteer-based programme that places computing professionals in the classroom alongside teachers in order to build robust digital technology capability in their students.
