

At the end of 2020 the College commenced its transfer to one site. This amalgamation of campuses has been extremely successful and staff and students have worked very hard to ensure a smooth transition. Due to COVID we were unable to celebrate our Sion campus heritage and this will take place through a number of events in the next couple of weeks. Unfortunately, COVID restrictions still apply and a number of our celebrations have had to be invitation only. On Friday 12th March Brother Peter Carroll FMS Marist Provincial and Sister Mary Barbuto NDS will open our Charism garden to celebrate the Sion and Marist Charisms of the College. It is through the Charisms that Mary invites us to meet, know and love her son, our Saviour Jesus. On Saturday 13th March Bishop Greg Bennet will bless and the Hon. Darren Chester MP will open our new John XXIII expansion and redevelopment building. This will be followed by a graveside service at the Sale cemetery in remembrance of the Sisters of Our Lady of Sion that have served our community for the last 130 years. Later in the afternoon there will be a Mass and Decommissioning held in the Sion chapel with a formal dinner that evening. On Sunday the 14th March the Friends of Sion will be present at the 9.30am St. Mary's Cathedral Mass. This Mass will be followed by a gathering of past students on the Sion campus for lunch and a liturgy. Between 10.30 and 11.30am Catholic College Sale will open its St. Patrick's and John XXIII buildings for past student tours. On Sunday 21st March the College will have a COVID safe opening and tours of the Sion building. Participants wishing to tour the historical Sion building will need to register via this link.

I hope you're starting to become a little more familiar with your timetables, teachers and classrooms, and that you're feeling supported and confident. Correspondence from the College is also accessible via PAM, including most letters and excursion permissions. When new correspondence is generated an email notification is sent to alert parents/guardians.



I would also like to take the opportunity to highlight to students and their families that the College offers support structures to assist students' wellbeing and learning via their Pastoral Teachers and House Leaders. LEARNING AND WELLBEING

Students Safety When Cycling to School

Since the commencement of the school there has been an increase number of students selecting to cycle to school each day. Riding to school is a great way for students to keep active and get the recommended one hour of physical activity each day.

As our school is centrally located in Sale, students must ensure they arrive and depart the College grounds safely and follow all road rules and respect other pedestrians and motor vehicles.

Tips to stay Safe

Signs and signals

Cyclists must follow all traffic control signs and signals

including: red lights, stop signs, give way signs.

At crossings, if there is a bicycle lantern, cyclists can continue riding across when the lantern is green. For any other pedestrian crossings, cyclists must dismount and walk across the road.

Who can ride on a footpath

You can ride on a footpath if you:

- •are a child under the age of 13
- •are a person 13 and over who is accompanying a child under the age of 13
- •have been given and are following the conditions on a medical certificate that says you have a disability that makes it difficult for you to ride on the road. You need to follow the conditions on your medical certificate and show it to a police officer or authorised person when asked are an adult accompanying someone with a medical certificate cycling on a footpath.

Riding on a footpath or shared path

When riding on a footpaths and shared paths, a bicycle rider needs to:

- •Keep to the left on footpaths and shared paths (unless impractical to do so)
- •Give way to pedestrians

A cyclist is required to have a bell or similar warning device on his or her bicycle. When overtaking other path users a cyclist should use this warning device, or his or her voice to warn others.

Mobile phone use by the rider of a bicycle

Using a mobile phone is prohibited, except to make or receive a phone call or to use its audio/music functions provided the phone:

- •is secured in a commercially designed holder fixed to the bicycle, or
- •can be operated by the rider without touching any part of the phone, and the phone is not resting on any part of the riders' body but can be in a pocket.

Using a phone as a navigational device/GPS while riding is prohibited unless it is secured in a commercially designed holder fixed to the bicycle. All other functions (including video calls, texting and emailing) are prohibited.

The penalty is a fine of \$476. Demerit points do not apply to bike riders, but do apply to drivers of motorised vehicles.

Be seen during daylight hours

Installing and using flashing lights during daylight hours can make you more easily seen by other road users. Wearing a bright shirt over your uniform may also assist to be seen by motor vehicles.

Bicycle helmets

Cyclists and bicycle passengers need to wear a securely fitted and fastened helmet showing:

- •a mark of compliance with the Australian Standard, AS/NZS2063
- •the symbol of a JAS-ANZ accredited company (for helmets manufactured or imported after 1 July 2012)

Mandatory bicycle helmet laws were introduced in July 1990. This applies when riding: on roads and road-related areas; on bike and shared paths; in bike lanes; in recreational parks; in car parks; on footpaths.

In special circumstances, you might be eligible for an <u>exemption from wearing a bicycle helmet.</u> <u>Visit the Wearing a bicycle helmet page for more information about helmets.</u>

Riding to school with other riders

A cyclist can ride next to another cyclist (this is called 'riding two abreast) on the road with the following rules:

- •On single-lane roads, cyclists can't ride beside more than one other cyclist (unless overtaking).
- •On multi-lane roads without a bike lane, cyclists cannot ride more than two abreast in each marked lane (unless overtaking).
- •When travelling two abreast, cyclists shouldn't be more than 1.5 metres apart.

Tip for cyclists: when riding two abreast, consider other road users and if necessary, change to single file to help drivers overtake safely.

Looks like another busy year ahead for all Careers classes.

Our Year 12 students are currently exploring their individual career options for the future and their teachers will shortly interview each one of them. This brief interview, based on future goals, will help them to focus on where they want to go in 2022 and what they need to achieve in order to get there. Students need to be checking both the College Pathways Website and their emails regularly for communication from me regarding upcoming events relating to pathways, university early enrolments, scholarships and UCAT information for those who wish to pursue a career in Medicine.

This Wednesday we had a visit from the Defence Force Recruitment team via ZOOM. This was delivered to all students interested in a career in the Defence Force. In addition, next week's Year 12 Career classes will have the benefit of a presentation tailored to them including information on their GAP year program for 2022.

Year 10's have completed their Career Profile using a wonderful new tool on the my futures website. This allows them to create a profile for themselves mapping out their areas of interest and hopefully helping them to achieve a clearer understanding of their future career goals and how to achieve them.

Our work experience program is going ahead in Term 2 for Year 10's this year and some programs such as the Defence Force have already advertised for participants at the RAAF base Sale. Micro Mathematics Virtual After School Extension Program

The University of Melbourne is offering a free Micro Mathematics Virtual After School Extension Program for interested students. Students will get to explore mathematical problems at a deep level following the inquiry process.

The program will run using a virtual environment (Zoom and Google Classroom) and students will have 1 hour each week with the University of Melbourne, School of Mathematics and Statistics Outreach Team. Students will be given additional activities to complete in their own time.

Maths Without Limits provides regional students with free extra support in their maths studies, whilst providing them with insight into university life and encouraging them to pursue careers in STEM. Free maths tutoring is being offered in the following subjects: Year 10 Enhanced Mathematics, Units 1/2 and 3/4 for Mathematical Methods, Units 1/2 and 3/4 for Specialist Maths.

HOLOCAUST CENTRE INCURSION

Year 10 History - Jewish Holocaust Centre Incursion

Current Year 10 History students, approximately 80 of our current Year 10 cohort, had the opportunity to take part in an incursion run by the Jewish Holocaust Centre in Elsternwick on Wednesday the 24th of February.


Our History students have been investigating and learning about World War Two. Students looked at the political landscape after World War One and how this contributed to the rise of Hitler and the Nazi Party. Students have identified significant events and turning points of World War II, Australia's involvement and have gained an understanding of the nature of warfare. A key component of this area of study is the Holocaust.

This incursion was a wonderful opportunity to gain great insight into the horrors of World War Two and how they were able to be carried out, through firsthand accounts of those who have witnessed one of the greatest atrocities the world has ever seen.

Today we had a Zoom call with the Jewish Holocaust Centre, we were taken on a virtual tour of the museum and shown artifacts from World War Two. We were shown the striped uniforms worn by prisoners of the concentration camps and shown documents such as passports and letters. Our guide, Tracey, spoke about how Jews were stripped of their identity and dehumanised during the Holocaust. We watched multiple videos of World War Two survivors, who talked about their experience in Germany before and after the war, and the contrast between the inclusivity of the community. At the end of the session we were fortunate enough to speak to Sarah Saaroni, a survivor of the Holocaust. She shared her story of growing up in Germany and was 13 when the war started. When Sarah was 16, she was sent away by her family and had no choice but to live by a false identity; Sarah pretended to be a Christian Polish girl and worked in Germany during the War. One of Sarah's family 'friends' turned her in to authorities and she was sent to an extermination camp. Sarah described her experience here and explained that they paid no attention to her and simply ignored her, she was given no food or water. Luckily Sarah was able



to escape the camp, although she was not welcome back home. Sarah settled in Australia after the war. Many students were able to ask Sarah questions about her experience as a Jew during the holocaust. This was a great opportunity for us to all learn more about World War Two and the Holocaust.
