transition from onsite learning to Remote learning and back to onsite again. This process is not an easy task and all in our community are to be commended for your flexibility and resilience.

While many in our community struggle with social isolation and economic hardship, it is the smaller things that challenge many of our students. The wearing of face masks for example is a part of constant tension for many young people. Yet there is no choice and our teachers constantly remind a few students of this current requirement. Thank you for your support from home.

There have been several great year level camps recently. The Year 7s held their introductory camp at Licola Wilderness Village 25th – 28th May, and Year 8 held their catch up camp that they missed in 2020 at Licola Wilderness Village 11th – 14th May. Both camps focused on building community and reinforcing the College values of respect, dignity, inclusion and perseverance and their ownership by students.

Our Year 10 students travelled to Ballarat on the 10th – 14th May. Unfortunately, Tasmania was not available due to COVID restrictions and the possibility of sudden border closures. The students had a great time away together fulfilling pathways, history and cultural learning needs. When taking away nearly 500 students plus staff (on three camps) the background organisation is enormous, especially in a COVID era. Thank you to all our students and a special thank you to all our staff that generously give up their time with family and go above and beyond to ensure students are safe and have an enjoyable time, while learning some of life's lessons on relationships and community.

The College has now opened its new covered court area, technology extension and staff carpark. While there are still some works to complete, i.e. a new court surface in November, the facilities will have an immediate impact on the smooth running of the College through the delivering of curriculum, recreation, amenities and a safer traffic environment.

Last week the College was a hive of industry with Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 students sitting mid-year exams. While this can be a worrying task for some students it is good training for formal assessment, self-discipline and self-control. It can be rewarding for students that have applied themselves to their studies and a gently reminder of areas lacking application for students that have not used their time wisely. The exam process is organised by Kristine Morrison and our team of external exam supervisors, and they are all to be congratulated on the smooth process in place and applied.

# LEARNING AND WELLBEING

As we continue to progress towards the end of Term 2, students from Years 7, 8 and 10 were fortunate to share the experiences of camps with their peers and the accompanying staff.

The College appreciates the number of staff who attended these camps during this Term, providing opportunities for our students to obtain diverse experiences during their educational journey at Catholic College Sale.

Whilst the Year 10 students were fortunate to not only visit places of significance forming historical contribution towards Australian History but to also attend a Year 10 formal in Ballarat. The Year 7 and 8 students were also fortunate to attend their camps at Licola, partaking in a range of activities to challenge their group dynamics, along with stepping outside their comfort zone and building resilience, whilst meeting new friends within their cohort.

Both the Year 7 and Year 8 camp night activities provided the students with the opportunity to partake in group discussions identifying ways of improving the way their year levels can focus on the values of the College including engaging in their learning, whilst supporting the learning for others.

The four questions asked to each group included:

- 1. An important way to treat other people at all times.
- 2. An important way to allow others to learn in the classroom.
- 3. An important way to treat others in the schoolyard.
- 4. A suggestion for how to let someone know they are doing the wrong thing.

The responses created by both Year Levels on camp have been insightful and we continue to draw on their suggestions and work towards common expectations for all members in both year groups. Our goal is for both year groups to form their expectation towards working together as one and grow as a College Community.

During Term 2, Years 8 and 9 also had the opportunity to attend an on-site production from performing company Brainstorm Productions. This performance highlights the importance of personal responsibility, empathy, respect and resilience in the online world. The production took the students on a learning journey towards realising they must create an ethical roadmap to navigate the online world. When people post words or images, the key questions included how will they be received and what would be the consequences of their actions?

# **Library lunchtime activity - Interactive Fiction**

During lunchtime, interested students had an introductory session on using online software to create Interactive Fiction. Interactive Fiction is a story that has multiple storylines and the reader is involved in choosing options throughout the story that help direct the plot. The old-fashioned paper version is a "choose your own adventure" type of story.

Twine software makes creating an interactive story relatively easy. Students can easily see their storyboard, add photos, choose colours and page progressions etc. Stories can have simple two branch plots or become wildly complex and intertwined. Some students were already thinking of how stories they were currently working on could be adapted to an interactive model, whereas others were developing brand new story ideas.

In coming weeks we should have some fantastic Interactive Fiction to share amongst the group.



# **Book Spine Poetry**



### **Brainstorm Productions Performance**

On May 26th, CCS Years 8 and 9 students were fortunate to be given the opportunity to view the 'Flipside' performance, brought to our school by Brainstorm Productions, who have been performing for our students for the last 18 years. Brainstorm is "Australia's largest and most respected educational theatre company, reaching more than 360,000 students each year with its anti bullying, cyber safety and student wellbeing programs". Actors Daniel and Stephanie brought to life a real-world scenario, where an inappropriate online video was created, which then went viral. They explored the various consequences of sharing online content and tapped into the emotions experienced by all involved.





The performance was a hit with the students who engaged really well with the performance. The themes of safety, privacy, rights, responsibilities and mental health were all explored in a contemporary and relatable way, with our students participating in a question and answer session at the end. Students articulated how to interact positively with the internet and technology, and were able to identify who they could to talk to if they needed support.

Both delivered impromptu speeches with aplomb and should be congratulated for their efforts.






### **Melbourne Holocaust Centre Visit**

Year Eleven and Twelve History students recently visited the Melbourne Holocaust Centre as an adjunct to their examination of ideologies. Students were involved in a series of activities relating to using primary source material and historic artifacts to document the atrocities inflicted on the Jewish population of Europe prior to, and during, World War. One striking element of the tour included an unusual collection of buttons collected by the students of a Jewish school in Melbourne. The 1.5 million buttons represented the number of children executed during the Nazi reign of terror. A very sobering physical representation of the Holocaust indeed.

Students were also fortunate enough to meet with a Holocaust survivor whose survival in such perilous times was inspiring. To finish the day, students participated in a brief memorial service to commemorate those who died but to also pray for a more tolerant society in the future.



### Year 10 RESA Class

May is the the month of Mary, and our Year 10 RESA (RE Service in Action) students have been developing their understanding of the life and influence of Mother Mary. They have learned about her strength and compassion and the faith that she continually showed. The students visited St Mary's Cathedral recently where



Father Jithin spoke to them about the type of commitment Mary had to being the earthly mother of Jesus and the challenges she faced. He explained the various names given to Mary over the years that reflect her life and faith, and the students have learned some of the many prayers that are prayed to Mary to intercede on our behalf. Our students have created 'How to Pray the Rosary' booklets, and are currently making Rosary beads to send to Timor Leste, where our Marist Brothers and associates, work in partnership with the young people there. Our CCS students have enjoyed the hands on nature of their learning this semester, and look forward to completing all of the beads, ready to be blessed before they are shipped overseas.


# BOYS FOOTBALL
