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

Principal's Report



A Reflection for Lent

Welcome to our 2022 school year and our first newsletter. We have had a wonderful start to the year even with Covid restrictions throughout February. Our theme this year is:

Known and Loved

Dignity for All

Our theme is highlighted by the beautiful image "Our Lady of Loreto with the Refugees' Cloak". The image was printed by young Italian artist Margherita Gallucci. She dedicated the painting to "the sacredness of human life, to the sacredness and dignity of all those who are victims of cruelty, war and racism." Mary, defender of the displaced, the accompanier of the lost, the least and the lonely.

We see Mary's motherhood more easily as sacred, but we hardly realise the sacredness of every person. However, it is not too difficult to see this in the faces and souls of real people...children, women and men, victims of war, violence, injustice and poverty. We are called to recognize the preciousness and sacredness of every person, to welcome God into our hearts and homes.

This theme is the Marist theme for all of Australia as we celebrate 150 years of Marist education in Australia. The theme also draws deeper on our college theme of 'Every Student Every Day'. We are also celebrating 100 years of Marist education in Sale as we remember the opening of St Patrick's College in 1922.

At our first assembly (via Zoom) we started the year with a welcome to our beautiful Year 7 students by ringing them in with the Sion Bell which has welcomed students to our college for over 130 years.

We commissioned our College Captains for 2022 Gabrielle Stephenson and Sebastian Pendergast and they signed the Sion Bible which the Sisters of our Lady of Sion brought with them when they arrived in Australia in 1890. Fr Jithin blessed our school leadership badges and our school badges which were presented to school

leaders and each student as a sign of their role and importance in our college community. The college welcomed our Dux for 2021 Madison Connors (ATAR 97.4) and our 90+ Club members Charlotte Perkins (96), Marni McCubbin (94.4) and Avril Hadden (92.5). "Congratulations on a fantastic years work." Each year the college also presents the "Mother Raphaela Scholarship" to the highest three ATAR achievements above 90. The scholarship was established by a local family several years ago and provides \$500 each towards further study.

At last week's whole school Ash Wednesday Assembly (only our second in two years), we welcomed the Very Revd Fr Francis Otobo, newly arrived Parish Priest for St Mary's Cathedral. Fr Francis had our students mesmerized with his beautiful singing voice as he expanded on the theme of Hope by singing "Amazing Grace." Fr Francis used the theme of hope, love and forgiveness to encourage students to reflect on their own actions and desire for improvement and grace in this period of Lent. Everyone who was present is looking forward to sharing more time with Fr Francis.

We also used our Assembly to reflect on how we can turn 'Known and Loved – Dignity for All' into action. My question to the students was:

What do you practice every day? What do you prioritise?

Because what you practice you will get good at...eg. a subject, a sport, a hobby... What do you practice?

Do you practice **joy** in your life?

- Do you practice **peace** in your life?
- Do you practice calm in your life?

Or do you practice complaining...do you practice anger...do your practice worrying...?

What do you practice? Do you practice being kind? Because if you practice being kind you will become very good at it. And you will become so good at it that everything you do will be wrapped in your kindness. You may not see others follow your kindness and be kind to others but it will happen and your kindness will spread.

Be kind in how we speak to each other – how we include each other – how we help each other and how we support each other – how we stand up for each other...

We can all spread God's love.

Congratulations to all students who achieved success in our recent Swimming Carnival and to all students for their enthusiasm and participation. Due to unforeseeable circumstances, results will be published in the next Newsletter.



Students Safety When Cycling to School

Since the commencement of the school year there has been an increased number of students selecting to cycle to school each day. Riding to school is a great way for students to keep active and get the recommended one hour of physical activity each day.

As our school is centrally located in Sale, students must ensure they arrive and depart the College grounds safely and follow all road rules and respect other pedestrians and motor vehicles.

Tips to stay Safe

Signs and signals

Cyclists must follow all traffic control signs and signals including:

- red lights
- stop signs
- give way signs.

At crossings, if there is a bicycle lantern, cyclists can continue riding across when

the lantern is green. For any other pedestrian crossings, cyclists must dismount and walk across the road.

Who can ride on a footpath

- You can ride on a footpath if you:
- are a child under the age of 13
- are a person 13 and over who is accompanying a child under the age of 13
- have been given and are following the conditions on a medical certificate that says you have a disability that makes it difficult for you to ride on the road. You need to follow the conditions on your medical certificate and show it to a police officer or authorised person when asked.

Riding on a footpath or shared path

When riding on a footpaths and shared paths, a bicycle rider needs to:

- Keep to the left on footpaths and shared paths (unless impractical to do so)
- Give way to pedestrians

A cyclist is required to have a bell or similar warning device on his or her bicycle. When overtaking other path users a cyclist should use this warning device, or his or her voice to warn others.

Mobile phone use by the rider of a bicycle

Using a mobile phone is prohibited, except to make or receive a phone call or to use its audio/music functions provided the phone:

- is secured in a commercially designed holder fixed to the bicycle, or
- can be operated by the rider without touching any part of the phone, and the phone is not resting on any part of the riders' body but can be in a pocket.

Using a phone as a navigational device/GPS while riding is prohibited unless it is secured in a commercially designed holder fixed to the bicycle. All other functions (including video calls, texting and emailing) are prohibited.

The penalty is a fine of \$476. Demerit points do not apply to bike riders, but do apply to drivers of motorised vehicles.

Be seen during daylight hours

Installing and using flashing lights during daylight hours can make you more easily seen by other road users. Wearing a bright shirt over your uniform may also assist to be seen by motor vehicles.

Bicycle helmets

Cyclists and bicycle passengers need to wear a securely fitted and fastened helmet showing:

- a mark of compliance with the Australian Standard, AS/ NZS2063
- the symbol of a <u>JAS-ANZ (External link)</u> accredited company (for helmets manufactured or imported after 1 July 2012)

Mandatory bicycle helmet laws were introduced in July 1990. This applies when riding:

- on roads and road-related areas
- on bike and shared paths
- in bike lanes
- in recreational parks
- in car parks
- on footpaths.

In special circumstances, you might be eligible for an <u>exemption</u> from wearing a bicycle helmet.

Riding to school with other riders

A cyclist can ride next to another cyclist (this is called 'riding two abreast) on the road with the following rules:

On single-lane roads, cyclists can't ride beside more than one other cyclist (unless overtaking).

On multi-lane roads without a bike lane, cyclists cannot ride more than two abreast in each marked lane (unless overtaking). When travelling two abreast, cyclists shouldn't be more than 1.5 metres apart.

Tip for cyclists: when riding two abreast, consider other road users and if necessary, change to single file to help drivers overtake safely.

Welcome to 2022 – and we are so excited to be back on campus and working as whole school on one campus. This is such a positive for the Music Department as age is no barrier to playing music, and we can have musicians from all year levels playing and enjoying music together in our various ensembles.

The demand for music lessons is continuing to grow which is fantastic news not only for the Music Department but also for the College as a whole. We are so fortunate to have such high quality and experienced teachers working for us: Mr Roy Condeza for Choirs, Rock Bands, vocal, guitars, drum kit, keyboards; Mr Cruickshank (Concert Band) and Ms Roffe (Strings). This means that our ensembles can continue to grow in quality and quantity. We are so happy to be able to perform again, and we have already had a most successful lunchtime concert this term on our lovely Leaf outdoor stage. We will have after school concerts coming up early in Term Two so that parents can enjoy our performances and so that our ensembles and soloists get a chance to perform before upcoming Eisteddfods and other events. Dates will be available in the near future.

Places available

It is not too late to join in the activities in the Music Department – we have new members joining all through the year! We would particularly like more flautists and a string instrumentalist or two is always welcome. There is also one vacancy for acoustic double bass. Unfortunately some instruments are fully booked, but a waiting list exists, and in the mean time you could always try a second choice. Pick up an application form from Student Services and see Ms Roffe, or any of our other music teachers if you would like to start learning an instrument. All you need is enthusiasm and a willingness to practice regularly.

Ensembles

Playing music in an ensemble is an essential part of learning your instrument, and for most students the element that they get the most pleasure from. Joining a suitable ensemble is therefore a compulsory part of the College Instrumental Program. Our ensembles are not limited to those learning an instrument at school, however. If you have an interest in playing in one of our ensembles or singing in one of our choirs just let us know. Our most successful ensemble in 2021 – winning multiple trophies across all three Eisteddfods – MVC lost many Year 12's last year and is seeking any interested male voices to join the winning team.

Holocaust Incursion

Our three Year 10 History classes this semester have been investigating and learning about World War Two. Students looked at the political landscape after World War One and how this contributed to the rise of Hitler and the Nazi Party. Students have identified significant events and turning points of World War II, Australia's involvement and have gained an understanding of the nature of warfare. A key component of this area of study is the Holocaust.

Students had the privilege to participate in a Holocaust Incursion via Zoom run by the Jewish Holocaust Centre in Elsternwick. This incursion consisted of an introduction to the Holocaust, a virtual tour of the museum in Elsternwick and a Q&A session with a Holocaust survivor, Vivienne Spiegel. Students participated respectfully and asked very insightful questions throughout the session.

The Year 10 History students are congratulated on the way they conducted themselves whilst learning about one of the worst atrocities the world has ever seen.

Two perspectives from our Year 10 Students

On Wednesday, February 16th Year 10 students were privileged to speak with Vivienne Spiegel, one of the few holocaust survivors. As a 7-year-old with two younger siblings in this traumatic time, she told her personal story about her experience with being sent away by her mother for her safety. She was sent to a farm with a family 'Meme & Pepe' who hid her and her siblings for years before being taken to Australia to finally be safe from the horrific times happening all over Poland, Germany and France. "Did you feel safe on the farm with Meme & Pepe?" This question was asked by one of our year 10 students. Viv replied with a story explaining how she had to hide in a potato patch when any sort of transport, cars, trains or planes came near the farm just to be safe. Pepe had a certain whistle he used so that Viv and her siblings knew it was safe to come out. We thank Viv and the Jewish Holocaust Centre for taking their time to talk to us.

Wednesday the 16th of February was one of the most rewarding days having the opportunity to speak to Vivienne Spiegel, a holocaust survivor who shared her personal story and knowledge of the horrific and traumatic holocaust with our year 10 History students. From the description of her feelings to the stories of families and the traumas that still haunt her dreams, Vivienne told us "be kind to all no matter where they come from, what religion they are, just be kind." There is so much unkindness in this world and being kind to someone will go a long way. The morals learnt from this experience will carry through all people that listen to the incredible things the holocaust survivors have to offer us. Parents & Carers - Welcome to The Resilience Project

This year, we are excited to bring The Resilience Project into our school community and implement their wellbeing curriculum throughout our classrooms.

Current research tells us:

- 1 in 4 adolescents have a mental illness.
- 1 in 7 primary school students have a mental illness.
- 1 in 5 adults will experience mental ill-health throughout the year.
- 65% of adolescents do not seek help for mental illness.

<u>The Resilience Project</u> delivers emotionally engaging programs and provides evidence-based, practical strategies to support positive mental health and build resilience. Presentations will include stories and research on how we can build mental health in our day to day lives, and support the mental health of the children in our care.

We understand that as primary carers, you have an essential role to play in building positive mental health with your children. Through this program, teachers and students will engage in weekly lessons and activities around the key principles of **Gratitude**, **Empathy** and **Mindfulness (GEM**) to build resilience. To support what we're doing in the classroom, you will be given access to an online **Parent and Carer Hub** which will introduce you to The Resilience Project, build your own confidence around resilience, and give you ideas to help your children and their mental health throughout the year.

The Resilience Project's School Program has been evaluated by the University of Melbourne, with parents observing positive changes in how children handled home situations.

The evaluation also demonstrated the program had targeted benefits in building:

- Children's use of daily gratitude strategies and their sense of gratitude.
- Confidence and self-esteem, especially in relation to their peer relationships.
- Relationships at school and home.
- Knowledge and ability to express emotions.
- More supportive classroom environments.

Planning for a safe and supportive school community

On Friday 18 March 2022, National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence (NDA) is recognised in schools all across Australia. The NDA is Australia's key bullying prevention initiative, connecting schools and communities to find workable solutions to prevent bullying.

The theme for the 2022 NDA is Kindness Culture. CCS students and staff, through the SEED Pastoral Care Program, help to promote kindness through inclusiveness, respect, and creating and a sense of belonging for all students. Planning for a safe and supportive school community requires a whole-school community approach. Whole-school responses to bullying prevention build positive and supportive school environments by incorporating strategies for intervention at all levels, inclusive of students, teachers, parents and carers.

Three key characteristics outlined in the national definition of bullying distinguish bullying behaviours from other forms of peer aggression behaviours which do not constitute bullying. The key characteristics of bullying include:

- 1. Power imbalance
- 2. Deliberate intent to cause harm, and
- 3. Ongoing and repeated behaviour.

While the following behaviours of peer aggression do not constitute bullying, these behaviours may still be serious and require intervention at home and at school:

- Arguments and disagreements (where there is no power imbalance)
- Single acts of social rejection or meanness, or
- Isolated incidents of aggression, intimidation or violence.

It is important for our entire school community, including our staff, parents, carers and students to have a clear understanding of the definition of bullying to be able to distinguish these behaviours from peer aggression, and correctly identify and respond to incidents of bullying.


Knowing the <u>types of bullying behaviour</u> can also help you identify if the incident is bullying, or peer aggression. While neither of these behaviours are tolerated at Catholic College Sale, they do require different management strategies, and the first step for responding is to correctly identify the behaviour.

If you have concern that your child is being bullied, please contact the classroom teacher in the first instance. CCS also has two student counsellors who are available should you want to discuss any issues. Students are also able to report bullying on SIMON, Student Links, "Report Bullying."
