Principal's Report

Dear Community

On Wednesday our school community came together to celebrate 'Founders Day' in our College. We took the time to celebrate St Marcellin Champagnat and his formation of the Marist Brothers – to make Jesus known and loved – and provide education for young people in southern France and today throughout the world. We also took time to celebrate Theodore and Alphonse Ratisbonne and their vision of bringing different faiths together, especially the Jewish and Christian faiths. Their formation of the Sisters of 'Our Lady of Sion' led again to providing young people throughout the world with an education grounded in tolerance, acceptance and care for others.

We were very fortunate to have the presence of Fr Francis to celebrate our Mass and engage our students in practical examples of our faith in action and, as always, in song. Fr Francis's encouragement of active participation in our liturgical celebrations is a real blessing to our students.

Recently I and three other members of the College Leadership team, Cindy Foat, Rachael Bown and Jeff Hobbs, had the privilege of joining with Marist School Communities from around Australia at the Biennial Marist Conference in Brisbane. Again the message from Br Peter Carroll, Br David Hall and many other guest speakers and workshop facilitators was: "Known and Loved: Dignity for All". How do we as Marist Schools reach out to the disadvantaged and marginalized, how do we practice inclusion for all, and how do we ensure we are doing our very best for each of the students attending our schools?

The Sion community at their virtual conference to be held later in the year will focus on 'Educating for Hope.' How do we ensure our students see God's gift of Hope and Joy in a world challenged by poor decision-making and how do we empower each individual to make a difference in their own lives and to recognise their impact on others.

We have a tremendous amount to celebrate in our Marist and Sion Charism communities and we are so lucky that our school was chosen as the place to spread the Good News.

The new Catholic College Sale Limited Board has now met twice and is well and truly immersed in the process of governing the College. The new Board will meet twice per term to ensure governance issues are attended to promptly and efficiently. The Board initially has five members and hopes to expand to seven members by the end of this year and possibly nine members by the end of 2023. Employees of the College are not eligible to be members of the Board and the Principal and Business Manager are in attendance to provide reports and clarifications if required. The Board will initially have two sub-committees: 'Finance and Risk Committee' and 'Child Safe Committee.' As more members become available there may be a 'Faith and Mission Committee' and a 'Master Planning Committee.' Committees are chaired by a Board Member and relevant staff, as well as members of our community with particular expertise in a given area, may serve on the committee.

The College is indeed in an exciting stage of evolution as the Bishop of Sale and the Marist Provincial work to ensure their commitment to Catholic Education in Sale for another 100+ years.

A big Thank You to the College Learning Development Team led by Cindy Foat for organizing a brilliant and informative Pathways evening earlier this term. It is sincerely hoped that the information evening has provided clarity and assistance as students and families as they plot an education road to the future. The College has received many positive comments from the evening. These events always take an extra effort and expertise from individuals and I would be remiss if I did not thank Kristine Morrison, Ken Holmes, Jim Kelliher, Kristen Robbins, our teaching staff, administrative staff and maintenance staff for their 'above and beyond' approach to service to our community.

The College is currently preparing for:- our Performing Arts Festival led by our Music Learning Area and House Captains, our Junior Production to be performed early Term 4, and our Change of Student Leadership programme starting with College Captains, House Captains and the Student Voice representatives.

Learning and Teaching

In 2022 The General Achievement Test (GAT) will take place Wednesday 7 September in two parts: **Section A** assesses skills in literacy (reading and writing). **Section B** assesses general knowledge and skills in mathematics, science, technology, the arts and humanities. This is a new format compared to previous years.

The 2022 VCE and VCAL results release date is Monday 12 December. For further details and to stay up to date in this fluid climate please refer to the <u>VCAA</u> <u>website</u>.

As a part of their preparation for end of year exams, trial examinations will be held for students during the second week of the upcoming school holidays. These exams will be held at St. Mary's Hall and will be supervised by VCAA Supervisors. They will provide a valuable learning and preparatory experience for students. In addition, it will enable them to focus on any areas that need improvement for the extremely short amount of time available in Term 4. An exam timetable will be released to students in the coming weeks.

Learning and Wellbeing

As we approach mid-term, the College community have been active across many different areas including their academic pursuits and selecting subjects for 2023, representing the College in performing arts and the sporting arena, along with planning for the up-andcoming Performing Arts Festival. The Performing Arts Festival will bring a long-standing celebration of the Arts, enabling all students throughout the College to be involved. This is a new opportunity for all Year 7-9 students to embrace this long-standing tradition for the first time since their commencement at the College.

The College continues to be committed to offering our students with guidance and learning towards increasing the resilience of each individual through their participation with The Resilience Project program, to understand gratitude, empathy, mindfulness and emotional literacy and how these can contribute to positive mental health and wellbeing. Our Year 7 & 8 students attended a live performance from Brainstorm Productions this Term which involved an interactive production demonstrating the impact of risk-taking behaviours, substance use, resilience, mental health and choices.

The College continues to work toward identifying schoolwide expectations via the Whole School Approach to Positive Behaviour in schools program (WSAPBS). The Whole School Approach Team presented to all staff at the commencement of the term in preparation to share and develop understanding within the student cohort pertaining to school-wide expectations. All students and staff were surveyed at the commencement of term 3 to identify school-wide expectations to be implemented towards 2023. The College Whole School Approach Team will now prepare a similar survey for parents to undertake to contribute their views towards forming school-wide expectations for 2023.

As our Year 12 students focus on their studies and final exams over the coming months, the College was pleased to provide Year 11 students with the opportunity to apply for the following positions of Leadership within the Student Leadership Team.

- College Captains (2 positions)
- House Captains (2 positions per House)
- Student Voice Cabinet (1 representative from each Pastoral Group - 18 positions within the Years 10-12 Pastoral Groups. Year 7-9 Student Voice Cabinet will be provided details later this term).

The students were studying the Industrial Revolution and the Signal Box Museum gave them a first-hand experience of rail transport during that time. The students used the Signal Box as inspiration in writing a source analysis, as it gave them an insight into the development of rail transport in Gippsland, and particularly in Sale when the train line was new. The Signal Box was erected in 1888 and remains relatively the same as when it was built. The students were interested in the images and artefacts found in the museum and it was a great opportunity for an interactive educational experience.
