

Learning and Teaching

With term 2 concluding, we reflect on what a busy term we have had in all areas of our school community. I would like to take the opportunity to thank our wonderful staff who have contributed so much to the school. I also acknowledge our parent community for their strong and ongoing support of our work. Catholic College Sale is at its best when we are busy and connecting with peers and colleagues in a range of engaging classroom activities and throughout our celebrated co-curricular programs. I extend my sincere appreciation to the staff who empower and enable students to seize opportunities, develop and contribute to the school and wider communities, and represent our school as great examples of confident, respectful, and compassionate people.

Uniform Expectations



Yeah 10 Holocaust Incursion

On the 6th of June, the Year 10 cohort had the opportunity to take part in an incursion run by the Melbourne Holocaust Museum. Our English and History students have been learning about the Holocaust this term and this incursion complimented their study. This incursion was a wonderful opportunity to gain great insight into the horrors of World War II and how they were able to be carried out, through firsthand accounts of those who have witnessed one of the greatest atrocities the world has ever seen.

Holocaust Incursion students reports

On Tuesday the 6th of June, the year tens of Catholic College Sale experienced a virtual tour of the Melbourne Holocaust War Museum. We learnt interesting Information about what happened in the Holocaust, and extra background stories on individuals who made an impact to help others. One thing I found interesting was a lady who was a nurse had permission to go into the ghetto. She would save young Jewish children and babies with their parents' names on a piece of paper and return them to an orphanage after the war or their parents if they had survived. Joe Szwarchberg experienced the Holocaust at a young age. When he was 8 he and his family were forced out of Poland and brought to the ghetto in Kozienice. He was the youngest of 6 siblings, 2 brothers and 3 sisters. At 12 years old, he would work extra jobs to earn extra food to feed his family. His parents and two of his brothers were both murdered in front of his eyes. Joe spent time in multiple Nazi labour camps before finally getting liberated from Buchenwald concentration camp in 1945. There were points where he thought he was going to die of starvation, but he survived the war and moved to France when he was 16 and went to a Jewish orphanage to catch up on the schooling whilst the war was going on. A message was sent to his sisters that said he had survived; Joe reunited with his three sisters and was full of joy. Later in his teens, Joe migrated to Australia and from there on, started his new life. My class and I benefited from this experience as we got to physically talk to a Holocaust survivor, a once in a lifetime experience, and also gave us more understanding of World War 2 and the book we have been analysing 'Night.'

On Thursday the 6th of June, the whole of year 10 had an incursion from the Melbourne Holocaust Museum. We started this experience with being told a bit about the history of WW2 and the holocaust, then we were

given a virtual tour of the museum looking at the different artefacts that were on display. This ranged from Nazi propaganda to the pyjamas people were forced to wear in the concentration camps. We were told about different people who risked their lives to help protect the Jewish people from the mass genocide that was the Holocaust. Then to end the session we heard from Holocaust survivor, Joe Szwarcberg. Joe was born in 1930 and was the youngest of six children, he was just twelve years old when he was taken to his first camp, separated and entirely alone with none of his family being sent to that same one. Before being transported his home in Poland was turned into a ghetto, he risked his life on the daily to leave and get food for his family. Unfortunately while in the ghetto he witnessed his mother and brother be shot by Nazi soldiers. After being transported to his first camp he later was moved to Buchenwald which was the same camp that Elie Weisel was in, linking to our English classes as we read his memoir 'Night'. On April 11, 1945 he was liberated by the US army, and later moved to Australia; reuniting with his 3 sisters after they were also separated and put into a camp. He later went on to get married and have children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. His one message and purpose for speaking was for nobody to forget the atrocities that happened in the Holocaust, making sure that it never happens again.




