This has involved the College providing a self-review statement on key data, including results of the Diagnostic Inventory for School Alignment (DISA), which was completed by parents, students and staff. This information has been analysed by an independent external panel from MSA and a report compiled by the panel suggested recommended changes for school improvement in future. Learning and Teaching



As the term comes to an end, I would like to take the opportunity to thank our wonderful staff who have contributed so much to our school community. I also acknowledge our students for their positive contributions to Catholic College Sale in both learning and extracurricular activities. We only need to look at our social media page to see the diverse and extensive range of activities our students have had the opportunity to participate in. Catholic College Sale is at its best when we are busy and connecting with peers and colleagues in a range of engaging classroom activities and throughout our celebrated co-curricular programs.

It is also imperative that we continue to foster a positive partnership between home and the College. The Education Hub (2019) states, "Home-school partnerships are widely promoted for the positive impact they can have on students' motivation, engagement, behaviour, and academic and social outcomes." Teachers and parents share a responsibility for encouraging, modelling, and reinforcing appropriate social and learning behaviours.

We ask parents to collaborate with us and support their child and the College by:

- Demonstrating a positive attitude at home about school, teachers, and the importance of education.
- Keeping open communication with their child's teacher, Pastoral Teacher, and House Leader. Communicating any concerns directly with the College. This helps to address any difficulties and maintains a positive learning and social environment.
- Monitoring homework and assignments to make sure they are completed well and on time, and encouraging your child to work to the best of their potential, academically and socially.
- Demonstrating respect and good manners towards others in the school community, including teaching staff, administration, and other staff working in the school in person and via emails.
- Making themselves aware of their child's performance at school and being open to mutual sharing of concerns.

Pathways Expo

On the 18th of July, the College hosted the annual Pathways Expo. This evening is designed to provide students with as much information as possible to make informed decisions regarding their future pathways and 2024 subject selections that will support this. All students have made their 2024 subject selections at this time. The College is now in the process of developing the 2024 timetable. Students will roll into 2024 subjects at the beginning of Headstart on Monday, 27th of November. If you have any concerns about your child's progress and readiness to move into the next year, please contact our Directors of Senior Studies: Mr. Ken Holmes or Rachael Bown (Years 7-10).

Will I definitely be allocated my preferences? Maybe no. While every effort is made to accommodate the preferences of students, we are unable to guarantee that students will be allocated all of their preferences. A range of factors influences the allocation of preferences, including staffing, the popularity of particular subjects, the combination of student preferences, and the construction of the 2024 timetable. Nevertheless, students will study a rich and rewarding range of subjects, and it is extremely rare that a student's VCE/ VCE VM pathways would be affected.

Learning and Teaching

Throughout a semester, students will do at least one, if not more, tasks that they will receive feedback on. However, parents/carers and students are encouraged not to see these as significantly more important than the day-to-day tasks students are completing and getting feedback on in each lesson. It is through the day-today tasks completed in class that students build up the learning stamina they'll require to be successful in later years.

NAPLAN

Parents of students in Years 7 and 9 would have received their NAPLAN results in the mail. There have been changes to the way NAPLAN is reported. The NAPLAN proficiency standards now include 4 proficiency levels for each assessment area at each year level:

- Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.
- This replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard. The proficiency levels on the new reporting are based on the judgment of an expert panel of teachers who used student responses to NAPLAN questions linked to the Australian Curriculum to identify what students should be able to answer at the time of testing in each year to be considered as having met a challenging but reasonable expectation.

The Literacy and Numeracy Teams will continue to work with both Maths and English teachers to ensure they are meeting the needs of students across the academic performance spectrum. However, in recognition that literacy and numeracy skills are not only developed in English and Maths classes (respectively), we will continue to equip all teachers with strategies to address these skills across all subject areas.

VCE Trial Exams

As a part of their preparation for end-of-year exams, trial examinations will be held for students during the second week of the upcoming school holidays. These exams will be held at St. Mary's Hall and will be supervised by VCAA Supervisors. They will provide a valuable learning and preparatory experience for students. Additionally, it will enable them to focus on any areas that need improvement for the extremely short amount of time available in Term 4. An exam timetable will be released to students in the coming weeks. For further details and to stay up to date in this fluid climate, please refer to the VCAA website.

As final assessments and examinations come closer, our young people are more likely to be subject to stress, and it is important to remember that a healthy amount of stress is useful and helps with motivation. Parents and carers can play an important part in supporting their child's academic and emotional needs. Students benefit from studying smartly, for example, by using a study timetable, having a tidy study space without distraction, or organizing study groups with their peers. At the same time, it is important to keep a balance between studies and leisure. Young people should maintain their social connections, hobbies, and continue to regularly practice daily physical activity. Parents can support their child to ensure that they maintain a routine of a healthy sleeping pattern and eating habits. Student Learning Ef Wellbeing



The end of term three is looming large, and the College community continues to be a hive of activity across many different domains. Students at all ends of the spectrum have been working hard in their academic pursuits and have been selecting subjects for 2024. We have had a myriad of performers representing the College in the performing arts at Eisteddfods with great success. On the sporting fields, the College has been strongly represented in the traditional winter sports of Australian Rules Football and Netball. Whilst at House level the students have been busily honing their performances for our Performing Arts and Founders Day festival.

The College continues to be committed to offering our students guidance in developing resilience and positive Mental Health outcomes through their participation in "The Resilience Project" program. This term the program has been focusing on Empathy and Kindness. Adding to our education in this area our Year 7 & 8 students attended a live performance from Brainstorm Productions this term which involved an interactive production demonstrating the impact of risk-taking behaviours, substance use, resilience, mental health and choices.

The College continues to work toward implementing school-wide expectations of Respect and Responsibility, via the Whole School Approach to Positive Behaviour in schools program (WSAPBS). The Whole School Approach Team and the rest of the College community have been discussing and implementing actions around three key focus areas. We have been looking at what we can do to:

- Minimize distraction in the classroom
- Following instructions
- Consistently wearing the correct uniform

This term has also seen the implementation of a change in our Behaviour Support Process that is aimed at strengthening relationships between parents, staff and students. In conveying what is happening in the classroom, directly from the subject teacher, conversations about student learning and outcomes are now happening with more regularity.

Year level meetings have also been held with Years 7, 8 and 9 where these expectations have been outlined. Challenges with the behaviour of our young people in their interactions with staff and their peers have been present in schools for time immemorial. This does not however give anyone in our community an excuse to be disrespectful to others, nor to impact the learning and teaching opportunities of others at the College. In outlining this to our students we have been careful to point out that, many are indeed, being respectful and responsible and we have asked staff to focus on catching our young people "getting things right". This will be a work in progress however, I ask that parents and carers in partnership with the College, have discussions around the social skills that need to be exhibited in a caring community.

Student Leadership

Finally, as our Year 12 students rush toward the end of their time at secondary school and the College we wish them well in preparing for upcoming assessments and exams. This is a time of stress for some, as the reality of the significant change they face to their structured world looms large. We urge them to seek support in working with each other as a collective but also that they seek the counsel of trusted adults in their world and the Wellbeing and Careers teams here at the College.

EMPATHY & KINDNESS

You can practise empathy in a variety of ways. Below are some ideas you could have a go at doing with the family.



Kindness Walk

Head out for a walk and challenge the people you are walking with to see how many acts of kindness you can accumulate together while on your walk. Afterwards, discuss how it made you feel.

Support A Charity Or Organisation

Together as a family choose a charity or organisation you would like to support. This may be something you are passionate about or a cause you feel is in need.

- Research the best way you can support this cause.
- As a family, make a plan of what you are going to do.
- Work together to support your charity or organisation.

Neighbourhood Kindness Challenge

This is a great way to show kindness and build connection with your neighbours:

- Offer to walk your neighbour's dog or go for a walk with them.
- Take your neighbour's bins out or bring the bins in for them.
- Offer to do some gardening for them.
- Cook or make a neighbour a meal or some treats.
- Write a little kindness note and place it in their letterbox.
- Make a gift and deliver it.
- Stop and have a chat with your neighbour and ask how their day is going.

Pathways and Careers

As the year progresses, our Year 10s continue to undertake work experience and work on their job application skills. Students are reminded to constantly log into our <u>Pathways website</u> to check for new work experience opportunities and part-time work. Currently, you will see work experience offers from ESSO and the RAAF. These will be closing shortly. This website is regularly updated, and I encourage Year 10 students to take this opportunity to challenge themselves and explore the world of work.

This is a busy time for Year 12s as they move towards the end of their last full term at school. All students wishing to go on to follow the university pathway should by now have activated their VTAC account and begun the process. Students had several presentations from both in-school careers practitioners and Federation University on how to open a VTAC Account and make course and SEAS & Scholarship applications. Ms. Considine and I are always available to help with any queries students may have regarding this process. Please note ATARs will be released on the 11th of December, and change of preference closes on the 13th of December, with first-round offers being released on the 21st of December. Special Entry Access Schemes (SEAS) applications are now open and will close on the 6th of October at 5pm. I encourage all students to apply before the 15th of September, if possible, to receive a SEAS and Scholarships guaranteed VTAC review. Students should regularly check their school emails and the Pathways website for updates on university open days, early entry programs, and specific scholarships. We have done many activities that focus on how and why homelessness occurs and what we can do to help those who are homeless in our community. We have learnt that homelessness can look a variety of different ways and not everyone's experience is the same. We have related these topics back to Catholic Social Teachings, empathy and the importance of human dignity. Using this knowledge, we have put together this year's Homeless Sleep Out that will take place on Thursday the 14th of September. It is open to students in years 10-12 who would like to learn more about homelessness and how it affects people in our society. Both Year 10 and 11 RESA classes have also had the privilege of talking with Elvino from Timor Leste and Brother Frank from the Marist Brothers. Intermediate and Senior VCE VM

This term our VCE VM students attended the 2023 WorldSkills Australia Careers and Skill Show at the Melbourne Convention Centre. This is one of the biggest interactive careers events in Victoria, running over 2 days at the Exhibition Building. VCE VM students from both Year 11 and 12 attended this overnight excursion, learning about many different potential careers and skills pathways. In the time there, students were able to access more than 120 employers and education providers, learn about career pathways, witness over 60 skills on display, and see the best apprentices and trainees from across Australia compete in skill-based competitions.

They also had a great time navigating their way around Melbourne, visiting places like the State Library, ACMI, and a walk down Hosier Lane for some photos. Excursions like this are always a great team-building exercise, with many students demonstrating great leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills.



Learning Areas

Year 9 History

This semester, our Year 9 History students have been learning about historical events that occurred between 1750 and 1918. One of the key topics of learning was the Industrial Revolution, and students learned about the driving factors that contributed to the Industrial Revolution and the consequences of industrialisation. The assessment task required students to describe an invention or innovation that revolutionised industries and to draw a labelled diagram. Isabelle Earle, from Year 9, showed great initiative in creating a model of a power loom. The power loom mechanised the weaving process, creating fabric in a much quicker and more efficient way than using a hand loom. Isabelle's model is on display in the John XXIII building cabinet, and she is to be congratulated for demonstrating engagement and effort with her studies.


Day Five:

Emmett Hobbs




