Principal's Report

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

It is difficult to believe we are already at the end of Term One. So much has happened in such a short time.

Our young people have been asked to be aware of their own light and how they will reveal their spirit to others. They have been asked to focus on four key statements:

- Choose to be happy and share your happiness with others.
- Your star shines brightest when you make the right choices.
- How do you reflect your light?
- How do you choose to bring happiness to others?

The theme was introduced to our students at the Opening School Mass celebrated by Fr Aneesh. At the Mass we acknowledged our College Dux, Ruby Fisher (ATAR 99.15) and our 90+ Club members for 2023. The College Captains for 2024, Annie Perkins and Bailey Telfer, signed the College Bible. We welcomed our Year 7s and presented badges to our House Captains and Year 12 students.

Already this term, our students have accomplished so much in their learning and building community. Our Year 12 students experienced a four day Retreat that talked about relationships, spiritual growth, goal setting, self-esteem and planning for the future. Our Year 7s experienced a three day Camp and one day Charism Day that focused on our school, respectful relationships, developing friendships and having fun while caring for others.

Students have also been involved in Swimming Carnivals, Outdoor Education Camps, Caritas fundraising, Ash Wednesday services, class and yearlevel excursions to areas in Gippsland and Melbourne. Many of these learning adventures will be expanded upon in this newsletter.

As part of our community engagement programme, we were fortunate to have Susan McLean speak to our staff and parents on Cyber Safety on the 5th March. Susan is an expert in the field and has worked in the area for 30 years. Susan provided a very simple and frank explanation of the dangers of the internet and the need for parents to be aware of how their children were accessing information. The College is now working with Susan to provide an opportunity for our students to hear her speak on how to remain safe.

Congratulations to Cassidy Lenne who received the 2023 Premier's Spirit of Anzac Prize. Cassidy was one of only 12 students to receive this award and will now receive an opportunity to attend a study tour to Turkey and the Gallipoli Peninsula to honour the Anzac legend and values.

Last week you received a communication from Leonie Keaney, Board Chair Catholic College Sale Ltd. Leonie announced that I will be completing my Principalship of the College at the end of 2024. This early announcement provides the College Board with the opportunity and time to appoint a new principal for 2025. While I have many people to thank, I will be doing this at the end of the year. For now, I simply wish to mark the announcement by saying it is an absolute honour, privilege and joy to be a part of our beautiful community and am looking forward to working with students, staff and families for the remainder of this year.

Moreover, PAM serves as a centralised hub for correspondence from the College, including important letters and excursion permissions. With the added convenience of email notifications, parents/guardians are promptly alerted whenever new correspondence is generated. New Reporting & Feedback @ CCS

During 2023 the College rolled out a new reporting process with the key aim of ensuring feedback was as accessible and actionable as possible. PAM allows for real-time feedback on students' results and provides a greater connection between the College and home. The college wants to ensure feedback is timely so students and families have an opportunity to put in place improvement strategies prior to the end of the Semester.

Parents and students have access to three cycles of formative feedback during a semester. These formative reports will provide feedback on student engagement and organisation along with simple actions that the student can take to further their learning in each subject.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) for Year 7 and 9 students has been completed for 2024. NAPLAN tests assess student knowledge and skills in Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy. The results of the tests provide information for students, parents, teachers and principals and can be used to improve student achievement.

Learning and Wellbeing

General Issues:

Just a reminder to everyone in the community around our uniform expectations. Students need the correct shoes and socks and must have a hat at all times when outside during the first and fourth terms. The College would also like to remind the community that the wearing of garments other than those that are school approved, is prohibited. No T - shirts, hoodies, or any other sort of undergarments are permitted. Students will be asked to remove such items, and they will be stored at student services for collection at the end of the day.

New Legislation around vaping came into effect in January of this year outlawing Vapes and the provision or selling of Vapes to minors. This brings Vaping into line with, cigarettes and alcohol and is reflected in our school's policy. Vaping at school, having a Vape or being present when others are using a Vape, will result in suspension. Phones are regularly an issue in our lives and it is timely to remind the community of our phone policy. Students need to have their phones stored in their locked lockers at all times. The use of the phone for filming of other members of the community is prohibited.

Finally I would also like to remind students about the need to avoid inappropriate physical contact at school at all times. Think Respect and Responsibility when dealing with your fellow students and staff.

Whole School Approach to Positive Behaviour Support

In 2024 we continue our discussion around the support of positive behavior with our school wide expectations - Respect and Responsibility. These remain a constant, and reference to the School Wide Expectations matrix encourages our community to consider appropriate behavior in a variety of settings. This year, however, sees a slight pivot in this space to focus on a couple of universal strategies that support the school wide expectations. These are the building of relationships and the teaching of personal and social skills. Investing time in the development of these areas will assist in facilitating conversations around supporting positive behavior. Social and emotional skills include selfawareness and management. These are specifically addressed through The Resilience Project delivered during our SEED pastoral lessons and in our interactions in class using other resources.

The Resilience program is back for another year providing a space for our young people to reflect on their personal growth and mental health by viewing their world through the lens of Gratitude, Empathy, and Mindfulness. Swimming Carnivals

Our annual college swimming carnivals have traditionally been a terrific way to gather together and showcase school spirit to kick off the year. Our 2024 intraschool meets were no exception, with terrific attendance at both our Junior and Senior Swimming Carnivals, held on February 13th and 14th respectively.

Hosted by the Lex Glover Regional Aquatic Centre (Aqua Energy), students and staff were greeted by pristine, sunny conditions, conducive to enjoyable days in the water. Students had the opportunity to trial for various swimming strokes and participate in some lighthearted (at times competitive) games of water polo for inter-house bragging rights.

Once house representatives were decided for Freestyle, Backstroke, Breaststroke and Butterfly, the 50m pool would take centre stage for our 50m finals.

At our Senior Carnival, students had the honour of racing in our two memorial events; the Peter Canny 100m Freestyle and the Bernard Peavey 200m Individual Medley - both events named in honour of two prominent former students of the College.

In a tremendous effort, Zac Mezenberg (Champagnat) and Kayla Pratt (Theodore) claimed the Peter Canny 100m, while Kayla would join Max Stobie as the winners of the Bernard Peavy 200m IM. Congratulations to Zac, Max and Kayla on their wonderful achievements!

Kayla was also recognised for her exceptional individual performance at the senior carnival. The Year 11 Theodore student had an amazing meet, breaking FIVE existing records, setting new marks in the:

- 50m Freestyle (28.53 seconds, down from 31.11 ٠ seconds)
- 50m Backstroke (34.68 seconds, down from 37.99 seconds)
- 50m Breaststroke (41.50 seconds, down from 42.61 seconds)
- 50m Butterfly (31.69 seconds, down from 33.55 seconds); and
- Peter Canny 100m Freestyle (1:02.07, down from 1:06.54).

Breaking five records in the same year is one of the more remarkable individual performances over the last decade of sport at CCS. Some of these records have stood for 16, even 20, years. Collectively, Kayla wiped 13-and-a-half seconds of the existing records in these events. Congratulations Kayla on a wonderful achievement in the pool!

SSV CRICKET – WELLINGTON PRELIMARY ROUND

The interschool cricket season kicked of this term, with Catholic College Sale facing off in Twenty20 matches against Maffra Secondary College.

Year 9/10 Cricket

After losing the toss, CCS were sent in and asked to post a competitive total. Our openers got us off to a great start, with Mitch Robinson and Monty Mayman playing a range of shots early. Mitch would go on to make 51* retired, while contributions from Josh Duffield (18*) and Blake Rowley (26) ensured we reached a competitive total of 3/135.

In response, Maffra's top three batsmen proved difficult to dismiss, only letting CCS take one wicket on their way to 1/94. Jack Armstrong was CCS's lone wicket-taker (1/13 off two overs). Asher Higgins and Will Fry both bowled well, only going for eight runs of their three overs in CCS' 41-run win.



Year 8 Cricket

Batting first, the Year 8s got off to a steady start, with Jaxon Grant and Ollie Sullivan both playing watchful innings'. Grant's wicket in the third over brought captain Xavier Hurley to the crease. The two would put on 100 runs for the 2nd wicket, before Hurley retired on 57* off 37 deliveries, including 8x fours. While Sullivan was out just short of his half-century (43), this meant the CCS middle order batsmen got some important time out in the middle, pushing the total to 5/146.

In response, CCS put in a terrific bowling and fielding performance. Mac Birss (3/7 off two overs) and Will Foster (3/4 off two overs) were the main destroyers, but Zac Bird (1/5), Archie Domaille (1/6), Oscar Hall (1/5) and Xavier Adam (1/5) also chipped in with timely wickets to have Maffra SC all out for 42.



Year 7 Cricket

A very strong performance from our Year 7 team has seen them progress through to the Wellington finals, to be held later this year. Batting first, CCS put on 3/180, with a number of players retiring in order to share the batting around. Our leading scorers were Lachie McMaster and Sam Duffield, who put on 35* and 33 respectively. After losing a wicket early, the co-captains put on 89 for the 2nd wicket, to put the side in a really great position. In a very pleasing sign, six batsmen reached double figures.

In reply, the wickets were shared by several CCS bowlers. Dexter Dent (2/5 off three overs), Rusty Dowsett (2/1 off three overs) Cooper Richardson (2/0 off one over) snared two each, as CCS had Maffra SC out for 27.

From here, our three teams will play the winners from the Traralgon-end of the Wellington preliminary games, later in the year.

Year 9's Developing Crazy Good Ideas at Gippsland Social Innovators.

Across February 15th and 16th, 60 Year 9 students from Sale College, Maffra Secondary College and Catholic College Sale came together for a two day Social Innovators program facilitated by <u>Crazy Ideas College</u> (CIC) and enable by Esso Australia.

On Day 1, students selected a passion topic related to various environmental and societal issues and formed teams with like-minded peers around these. Together, they brainstormed and developed crazy good ideas, and finished the day building a prototype of their favourite big idea which was carried forward. With a sense of pride about the progress made and some weary heads, there was a real buzz of excitement and anticipation of what tomorrow would bring.

Day 2 progressed swiftly as teams focused on creating achievable experiments to test their big ideas. Excitement filled the air as teams prepared to pitch their issue, big idea, and experiment to a panel of 12 community partners. The energy and dedication of the students were evident as they eagerly presented their projects, showcasing their passion and commitment to making a difference. As the partners shared what they loved about each idea and who in the community may be able to assist them in bringing it to life. The community partners included; Arpit Zaini and Amanda Santa Maria from Esso Australia,

Bell Northway from Headspace, Ash Goodsell from Days Like These Creative, Meg Capurso and Helen Waddington from Wellington Shire Council, Georgina Glanville from Gippsland Art Gallery, Joy Churchill and Julian McIvor from Sale Business & Tourism Association, Randolph Yarram from Ramahyuck, Rachel Ronaldson from Gipps Sport, and Kelly Morris from Central Gippsland Health.

The students' ideas ranged from a 'Good Times - Bad Times Get Better' gratefulness app to help young people when they are feeling down, to a combined Debutante for the elderly and youth. The students received overwhelmingly positive feedback from the partners, with many teams being offered support and guidance in taking their Smart Start Experiment to the next stage of development.
