
PRINCIPAL'S REPORT




This is a great opportunity for students from Years 7 to 12 to study in a quiet, supervised environment and get their homework tasks completed. So much can get done without distractions!


Year 9 Digital Technology and Design

Steve Jobs, Mark Zuckerberg and Bill Gates have all said that students should learn how to code. It's a skill that not only teaches students how to work with computers, but also teaches them how to think about solving problems with systems.

Students in Year 9 Digital Technology and Design learned to code in Python and competed in the NCCS challenge organised by the University of Sydney. A number of students received a high distinction in the challenge and Kasey Peverill received a place in the Top 30 of the competition.

Students have also learned to program with the BBC MICRO:BIT. The BBC micro:bit is a pocket-sized computer that lets you get creative with digital technology. Students can code, customize, and control their micro:bit to create all sorts of unique creations, from robots to musical instruments and more.

At half the size of a credit card, the amount of hardware each board is equipped with, including 25 red LED lights that can flash messages. There are two programmable buttons that can be used to control games or pause and skip songs on a playlist. The micro:bit can even detect motion and tell in which direction you're heading. It can also use Bluetooth Low Energy (BLE) to interact with other devices and the Internet. The micro:bit features an embedded compass, accelerometer, mobile, and web-based programming capabilities.

YEAR 9 DEBATING

Debating has certainly been placed front and centre for Year 9's curriculum!

Debating sharpens students' ability to communicate by teaching them to be precise and clear in their thinking. It helps to develop confidence through building an understanding of how other people reason and argue, learning through the expression of one's own feelings and recognising those of other people. It builds a love of the 'drama of debate'. It allows students to build their general knowledge, which in turn, can be used in all areas of the curriculum. Debating is a team sport. Students must work together when preparing cases and during the debate. It also means that each speaker within the team has certain roles to play.

Today we had six energetic teams play off in their Inter-class debates. Each English class had a team of three – the Dream Team - to represent them against another English class. They were given a topic and a few days to research and organise themselves.

All Year 9 students were present to support their representatives in their relevant debate. The topics were relevant for the student ages and interests:

- 1. Theme Parks are a waste of time.
- 2. Technology makes people lazy.
- 3. Children should be involved in several extra-curricular activities.

The calibre of the arguments and presentations was high. Each speaker was able to strongly show their understanding of their role within their debate team. Depending on how the points fell, the two top teams debated against each other.

The grand final topic was Schools Should Block Youtube. As it was an impromptu debate, the two finalist teams were given one period only to organise and research their topic. They did not fail to deliver! Not only arguments, but also rebuttals, were strong and decisive. The audience and adjudicators were given a debating show to be remembered. However, there can only be one winner, and congratulations to Ms. Davidson's English class in Alex Stephenson; Pearce Richter; and Sam Berry, who were able to persuade the audience that schools should block Youtube.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.
