

Trying to avoid some of the pitfalls and misperceptions that still exist

## SCHOOL ASSESSED COURSEWORK

- SAC's
- Assessment tasks specified in the study design determined by VCAA.
- Usually part of the regular teaching and learning program.

#### SCHOOL ASSESSED TASKS

- SAT's
- Used in studies where products and models are assessed (e.g. Food Tech, Studio Art etc)
- Due dates for the assessment of SAC's/SAT's must be met
- They become part of VCAA policy
- Professional evidence is needed to explain an absence from a SAC/SAT

#### **ASSESSMENT**

- Units 3 and 4 combination of internal (SACS or SATS) and external assessment (EXAMS).
- Passing VCE and achieving an ATAR score are two different things.
- You do not "fail" VCE

#### **EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENTS**

- Students are now responsible for a significant part of their learning.
- Due dates for assessment must be met.
- Students must apply for an extension before the due date - only given for certain reasons.
- Students should inform teachers immediately of any concerns.


# Use of computers and lost work

## PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

- The VCE years can be a testing time for some students and parents.
- Parents need to be aware of the demands placed on students.
- Parents should contact the school if they have any concerns.

#### VCAA STUDY SCORES

- Exam scores are vital SAC grades are moderated to exam scores.
- VCAA produces a final study score for each student from 0 to 50 with an average of 30.



The VCE scores aim to differentiate between student performance

#### VCAA STUDY SCORES

- This score is not a "mark" or "grade" as it indicates a students "position" in that study.
- In other words, the 'score' reflects the relative position achieved by a student compared to every student in the state completing that study.

- approx. 2% of students will score above 45
- approx. 9% of students will score above 40
- approx 16% of students will score above 37
- approx 50% of students will score above 30

These figures are applicable for each VCE study.

# A misunderstanding

- How do letter grades for coursework and exams relate to final scores?
- It must be noted that an "A" can encompass a broad range of grades and therefore, a broad range of scores or 'positions'.

## **EXAMPLES**

Some 'real life' examples of variations in study scores;

Α+	<b>A</b> +	<b>A</b> +	47

# VTAC and the ATAR (ENTER)

- VTAC will 'scale' all study scores accounts for the strength of competition within a study.
- Equalises students rankings, or positions, amongst **ALL** students completing VCE.
- Students <u>are not</u> disadvantaged in their choice of subjects.
- If they are good enough they will achieve a high score irrespective of the study

#### Note: there are a number of scored VET studies

They are moderated and scored in the same manner as VCE studies

they contribute to the ATAR (ENTER) in the same manner as VCE studies
